As President of the Maryland Foreign Language Association, I write to you on behalf of our Board of Directors. We wish to commend you for your support of the proposed COMAR regulation 13A.04.11 to require all counties in the state of Maryland to begin a sequential program for world languages in the middle school. Many counties already offer this opportunity to their students but this will cast the net even further.

Maryland's world language high school students have received a long list of awards in local, regional and national world language contests. Some of our Maryland world language teachers are well known for the high quality instruction that they provide to their students. The next appropriate and long anticipated step is to begin required sequential language instruction in the middle school for everyone. Research continues to indicate that the longer the language sequence, the more proficient students will be.

Our national and international global society demands individuals who are competent both culturally and linguistically in a second language. This will expand students' personal and professional boundaries in meaningful ways. This proposal will allow Maryland students to lead the way. Again, on behalf of all the world languages teachers and their students in Maryland, we salute you for your forward thinking in the support of this new regulation.

The Maryland State Board of Education approved COMAR 13A.04.11 World Languages at its meeting on January 26, 2010.



Fall 2009 Conference Update

A Great Success Thanks to Members Like You!

Happy New Year to all our members! You have made this past year one of our most successful and accomplished.

Looking at the second half of 2009, we experienced a highly successful and very well attended Fall Conference at Anne Arundel Community College in October. As a result of your participation, MFLA has increased membership and has expanded the scope of sessions offered at the conference.



On Friday, October 16th, we offered two Swap Shops in two rotations and five specialized workshops. Helena Curtain was our Keynote speaker and she stressed how crucial it is for foreign language teachers to continually update and strive to pass along their passion for foreign language by immersing students in meaningful

communication even as beginners. During the banquet, we honored our 2010 Language Teacher of the Year, Souley Dounda, and we awarded the 2009 Celeste Carr Teacher Study Abroad Award to Gail Love, and the 2009 Escola Teacher Incentive Grant to Hillary Sachs.

We had a total of 218 registrations, and participants had a choice of attending over 40 sessions which targeted 6 different languages. Some of the sessions were so popular that participants requested repeating them on rotation for the next conferences. In attendance were a total of 18 vendors that included old favorites and some newcomers.

Conference evaluations were very positive with commendations in the areas of quality of sessions (especially on the variety available) and the conference's contribution to professional development. We will work to include your recommendations in future conferences and we look forward to seeing you at our MFLA 2010

Spring Conference: *World of Change: iTeach for Tomorrow* to be held at James Hubert Blake High School in Montgomery County on March 13, 2010. As always, our Spring Conference will focus on technology

Mr. Souley Dounda, the 2010 Maryland Language Teacher of the Year, hails from Niger where he first developed a passion for learning French and English. Souley brings a unique set of experiences, qualifications and attributes to his teaching and mentoring of other colleagues.



Souley holds advanced degrees from the University of Niamey in Niger and from the University of Central Oklahoma and has leadership and management experience as a Principal of a High School in Niger. He is a former consultant with the United Nations Development Program in Niger.

With a Maryland Advanced Professional Certificate in French and ESOL, he is a committed education practitioner with a broad experience in teaching French and English as a Foreign Language. He is currently a middle school teacher leader at John Hanson French Immersion School in Prince George's County Public Schools, Maryland. He has a Masters degree in English and in Bilingual Education, and frequently attends professional development workshops and conferences.

Fluent in French, English, and other African languages, Souley shares his passion for learning with everyone he meets. His commitment to excellence for himself and his students was recognized in 2008 when he was named Foreign Language Teacher of the Year for Prince George's County, Maryland. Souley is currently a candidate for National Board Certification. As the Maryland Language Teacher of the Year, Souley will represent our state in the regional competition this spring at the NECTFL conference.

Take the Next Step

Local educator, Alice Zhang, was among 400 U.S. education leaders traveling to China to “Take the Next Step” with Chinese language and culture programs.

Ms. Alice Zhang was among 400 U.S. school district leaders and education decision-makers who participated in the **2009 Chinese Bridge Delegation: Taking the Next Step** — a one-week education visit designed to strengthen and expand Chinese language programs in U.S. schools. The trip took place from Dec. 2 through Dec. 10 and was sponsored by Hanban/Confucius Institute Headquarters in partnership with the not-for-profit College Board.



This fifth Chinese Bridge Delegation trip was tailored to the needs of institutions already offering Chinese language programs, with a focus on in-depth school visits and educational workshops. The participants attended presentations on successful models and available resources, joined in partnership-building activities, and shared experiences and best practices for building Chinese language and culture programs with U.S. and Chinese educators.

“We’re encouraged by the enthusiasm educators have shown for the Bridge Delegation in both the U.S. and China,” says Gaston Caperton, president of the College Board. “Since the program’s inception in 2006, we’ve taken 2,000 U.S. educators to China to experience firsthand the culture of a country that is rapidly changing and growing

on the global stage. We also now have 138 Chinese guest teachers currently in the U.S. teaching our students Chinese language and culture.”



Ms. Zhang’s mission of this trip was to search educational partnerships for Baltimore International Academy, a charter school of Baltimore City Public School System. She visited several schools in Chongqing, Sichuan. On behalf of the school, she signed Memorandum for partnerships between Baltimore International Academy and Ren He Jie Primary School of Chongqing, PRC. Ms. Crystal Chen’s Chinese Immersion Third Grade will pair with Class 9 Grade 3 of RHJ Primary. It is planned that BIA will start Study China Program in Spring, 2012.



Hanban / Confucius Institute

The [Hanban / Confucius Institute](http://www.international.umd.edu/cim/) at the University of Maryland College Park, established with support from the Office of Chinese Language Council International (OCLCI), promotes the study of Chinese language, culture, ethics, and philosophy, and furthers the understanding of China today. Alice Zhang, one of three new MFLA Board members, earned her Master's degree in special education and did graduate work at Morgan State University in the field of International Studies. She began teaching in Baltimore City Public Schools in 1997. Alice helped establish the Chinese Immersion program, developed and wrote application for candidacy of PYP International Baccalaureate for Baltimore International Academy. She started the Chinese program in Howard Community College in 2003 and Carroll Community College in 2009. She works as the Director of Study China in Howard Community College as well as a lead instructor in Summer Arabic and Chinese Teaching Program at McDaniel College. Alice served for MSDE Chinese Validation Panel. She is College Board certified Chinese AP Reader. As the first vice president of Chinese Language Teachers Association at National Capital Region, Alice has organized two regional Chinese teaching conferences. In her spare time, she likes to cook, travel, meet friends and help people.

For Students

Visual Arts Contest

Celeste Carr Study Abroad

Escola Teacher Incentive Grant

Through this grant, MFLA encourages teachers to develop innovative ideas and share them with colleagues. This grant program

offers financial support to a **MFLA member** who wishes to complete a project related to classroom instruction. This award is open to teachers of all curricular levels. The awardee will receive a personal grant of \$500 as well as a grant to cover materials up to \$500 related to the project. Application deadline is **April 24, 2010**.
